# **'THRIVE' GALA SETS FUNDRAISING, ATTENDANCE RECORDS IN SUPPORT OF REHABILITATIVE CARE FOR KIDS**

The Mary Free Bed Foundation celebrated its fifth annual gala with the biggest crowd of supporters yet, gathered to show their dedication and belief in the hospital's mission. More than 930 guests helped raise \$300,000 to create brighter futures for kids and their families.

"'Hope' is a word we hear all the time at Mary Free Bed, every day. So is the word

'freedom' – freedom to really live, to really live independently," said CEO Kent Riddle, addressing those gathered for the Nov. 3 event at DeVos Place. "Forty thousand people came to us last year for hope and freedom. That's 300 percent more than were coming to us seven years ago, and it's one third of those who will be coming to us seven years from now."

That figure includes children with disabilities, no matter where they live. Proceeds from the gala will benefit the foundation's new pediatric initiative to ensure children have access to the specialized treatment Mary Free Bed provides. It also supports new or expanded pediatric programs focused on autism, cerebral palsy and chronic pain. "We will never limit what this amazing organization can do for people," Kent said.

The gala, titled "Thrive," featured heartwarming stories shared by patients with cerebral palsy who have benefitted from rehabilitation at Mary Free Bed. The pediatric initiative supports expansion of that care, including a new Early Development Program for babies

from birth to the age of three.

The program, developed by Dr. Lisa Voss, helps determine if a baby is developing normally or shows signs of a problem, such as a neurological issue that may help diagnose cerebral palsy much sooner. Research shows early intervention for many diagnoses can make a significant difference in a baby's healthy development.

Helping children and adults affected by serious injury or illness to reach their fullest

potential is what fuels the culture at Mary Free Bed and draws people to support its efforts.

# LILA DELINE'S RECOVERY FROM INTERNAL DECAPITATION CALLED MIRACULOUS

Lila DeLine was waiting to turn into the driveway of her Cedar Springs home on a summer day in August when her vehicle was struck from behind. The force of the impact was so great, her skull was dislocated from her spine, threatening her life.

Her husband, witnessed the crash and rushed to Lila's side. While waiting for an ambulance to arrive, he supported Lila's head so she could breathe.

"He knew enough to secure my neck and my head before moving me," Lila said. "He got me sitting up into a position where I could breathe again, and that saved my life that day."

When she arrived at Spectrum Health, Lila could communicate with small eye movements and by mouthing words. The critical care and surgical teams worked to stabilize her and assess her injuries, the most serious an occipital-cervical dislocation. "Essentially what that means is, her trauma was so severe that it tore all the ligaments that connect the skull to the spine -- a very common injury among traffic fatalities," said Dr. James Stubbart, an orthopedic spine surgeon who realigned Lila's head and neck, stabilizing it with a combination of rods, screws and a titanium plate. "I truly believe in miracles. I always have, but I especially do now."

Lila spent eight days at Spectrum Health before she came to Mary Free Bed to begin rehabilitation. At first, she needed mechanical ventilation to help her breathe, so respiratory therapy was an integral part of Lila's initial plan of care.

"It took four staff members to get her sitting at the edge of the bed," said Kristy Simpson, a physical therapist on Mary Free Bed's Spinal Cord Injury team. "We were coordinating with respiratory therapy, and they were managing humidified air through the trach mask. She sat at the edge of the bed for about five minutes, and that was her first rehab experience."

During the next two months, she participated in intensive physical, occupational, speech language and recreational therapies to gain physical and emotional strength, communication skills and endurance. The respiratory therapy team worked with Lila to wean her from the ventilator, build her pulmonary strength and remove her tracheostomy.

In late October, Lila graduated from the inpatient program and walked out the door with her husband and children by her side.

Lila says she's thankful to live in a community with excellent medical facilities and experienced medical professionals.

"We need to be thankful for our incredible medical system," Lila said. "(Spectrum) knew exactly what to do, and I was very well taken care of.

"As for rehab ... I came to a facility where respect and loving nature are what carried me through this."

Since then, she's continued her rehabilitation journey with outpatient therapy at Mary Free Bed.

"We're working on endurance and progressing with higher-level balance activities," said physical therapist Jacob Miller. "We're helping her get back to the things she wants to get back to."

### PERRIGO, DRIVE TEAM UP TO RAISE AWARENESS, FUNDS FOR PACERS, ROLLIN DRIVE

Fans of the Grand Rapids Drive had the opportunity to experience the fast-paced, competitive play of wheelchair basketball during a half-time exhibition game between Mary Free Bed's Pacers and Rollin Drive.

The two teams faced off during halftime of the Drive's Dec. 15 game against the Westchester Knicks at the DeltaPlex in Grand Rapids. The Drive is the official G League affiliate of the Detroit Pistons.

During the game, the Drive debuted special holiday edition jerseys presented by Perrigo, a global healthcare company. Fans bid on the game-worn jerseys, and Perrigo donated all proceeds to Mary Free Bed's Wheelchair & Adaptive Sports program for its wheelchair basketball teams. Half of the proceeds from the Drive's 50/50 ball toss also were donated to the program.

"We raised \$1,273 between the jersey raffle and 50/50 ball toss," said Christy VanHaver, the teams' coordinator. "It was a great event to not only raise awareness in the community about Perrigo's mission and our WAS adult wheelchair basketball program, but it raised some much-needed dollars for our teams."

Funds will be used for team travel expenses as they vie to qualify for the National Wheelchair Basketball Tournament this spring.

The Mary Free Bed Pacers is a men's D1 team that competes nationwide, while the Rollin Drive is a DIII co-ed team that travels regionally to compete. Thirty athletes compete on the two teams.

**Chicco Pocket Snack Booster Seat** (\$30 each, two requested) – Compact and easy-to-set-up booster seats would be used in our outpatient Pediatric Feeding Program.

**Oculus Go 64GB Virtual Reality system and accessories** (\$300) – This virtual reality system would be used to reduce anxiety or pain, simulate community mobility elements for standing-balance practice and many other therapy applications.

**Pediatric Feeding Program education materials** (\$1,500) – Nutrition information guides, specialty nutrition plates, placemats, feeding cups and totes are tools needed to help patients and their families maintain proper nutrition and healthy eating habits at home.

**Enthermics Blanket Warming Cabinet and blankets** (\$3,600 each, four requested) A blanket-warming cabinet stores and warms linens, blankets, hospital gowns and sterile, intravenous (IV) and surgical irrigation fluids in a medical environment. A warm blanket can ease the anxiety and stress our patients feel during their recovery.

**VibePlate Parallel Bar Platform** (\$7,500) – Vibration platform used for supportive gait training and therapy.

**Mary Free Bed Virtual Services equipment** (\$6,700-\$13,000) – Partial or full equipment package to provide patients outside Grand Rapids with access to specialized services.

**Biodex Balance System SD** (\$15,000) – Technology to improve balance, agility and muscle tone in older adults and athletes.

**REPEX Therapy Table** (\$9,000) – Enhances effectiveness of the McKenzie Method, a highly targeted assessment and treatment process that addresses a variety of musculoskeletal impairments.

**BTE Simulator II** (\$42,000) – Equipment duplicates activities of daily living to assist patients in pain management.

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
