# ARCHITECTURAL FIRM SELECTED TO DESIGN THE STATE'S FIRST CHILDREN'S REHABILITATION HOSPITAL

Architects across the country expressed interest in designing Michigan's first children's rehabilitation hospital. After narrowing the field to four firms, our selection team met each finalist at one of their past projects, traveling to lowa, Massachusetts and California. The site visits enabled our team to see innovation in action and learn how advanced technology can improve efficiencies, enhance patient care and elevate the rehabilitation experience for children and parents.

The award-winning architectural engineering and planning firm, SmithGroup, was selected to design the children's hospital and promises "an iconic, breakthrough building." Honored with 400 design awards during the past five years, the SmithGroup's integrated team has specialized expertise designing forward-thinking rehabilitation and pediatric facilities. "The children's rehabilitation hospital will be a revolutionary resource enabling us to serve thousands of additional children each year with leading-edge treatment," said Kent Riddle, Mary Free Bed CEO.

The \$60 million project is a public-private fundraising partnership. The first children's rehabilitation hospital in Michigan and the ninth in the nation, it will enable clinicians from Mary Free Bed and Helen DeVos Children's Hospital to collaborate more closely. Getting kids into therapy as quickly as possible after an illness, injury or other diagnosis, results in better outcomes. #### **ACTS OF KINDNESS**

Brooklyn Zylstra, an 8th grader at KPS Pinewood Middle School, is bringing joy to kids who are on their journey to recovery. In December 2020, Brooklyn, who is a competitive gymnast, fractured a growth plate in her elbow. To help with the pain and range of motion following a diagnosis with a rare condition, she came to Mary Free Bed for pediatric inpatient therapy.

Every year since her stay, Brooklyn has raised funds to purchase books, toys, games and creative supplies for pediatric patients. This year, Brooklyn raised nearly \$1,000 for Mary Free Bed's Recreational Therapy program.



#### SHOPPING FOR GOOD

For fourth graders at Wealthy Elementary School, their business unit, named "Marketplace," means more than just business. Through Marketplace, students learn about entrepreneurship by creating their own business at which classmates can buy goods. They utilize the money they make to take an annual class trip to Mackinac Island. # Inside Mary Free Bed

## FOUNDATION'S PATIENT ASSISTANCE FUND HELPS **PROVIDE EXTRAORDINARY CARE**

In 2018, the Foundation established a Patient Assistance Fund to collect donations that were specifically given to help Mary Free Bed patients who need financial help to ensure a quicker and safer discharge from the hospital, a piece of necessary equipment or simply a healthy meal for family members. Since then, the fund has grown significantly and provided support to our patients in a variety of ways.

Working in conjunction with Mary Free Bed's care management team, the fund has provided more than \$143,000 over the past five years to help patients with critical expenses such as medication, equipment needs, transportation and meals during their stay, as well as home modifications so patients can be discharged to a safe and secure environment.

The impact of this fund is made possible by donations from community members and Mary Free Bed employees, whose contributions are made through the annual With a Mary Heart Employee Giving Campaign. #### The most recent allocations from the Patient Assistance Fund cover several needs:

- Equipment \$17,128 Various equipment needs to allow for safer and faster transition to home.
- **Transportation** \$3,812 Costs associated with transferring patients to another facility or home.
- **Medication** \$2,461 Prescription allocation to allow for quicker discharge to patients' home before health insurance coverage begins.
- Lodging \$725 Coverage for patient families to stay at The Inn at Mary Ives Hunting Center.

# **WISH LIST**

#### **Caloric Irrigator for Audiology**

Many of the children and adults we see have hearing impairments associated with other diagnoses such as brain injury. Caloric irrigation helps identify the degree to which the vestibular/balance system is responsive and determines how symmetric the responses are between the left and right ears. (\$7,000)

#### **Rifton K130 Small Mobile Stander**

A tandem bicycle further opens the world of cycling to those with disabilities. Adaptive sports participants with disabilities, such as visual impairments, will be able to bike with a sighted partner at the helm of this two-person bike. The Sport model can be adjusted for both children and adults. (\$2,400)

#### Annual plants & flowers for Therapy Garden LiveWall®

In Spring 2023, Mary Free Bed will be adding a live plant wall in the Margaret Bertsch Outdoor Therapy Garden. This will provide a beautiful, blooming privacy wall to create a more private microclimate for patients, families and therapists who utilize the therapy garden. Not only will this improve the aesthetic, but it can also help with patient care goals like target visual deficits, sensory needs and standing balance and strength. *(\$1,500)* 

#### Prosthetic Running Leg

Custom prosthetic devices are thoughtfully curated to each patient for optimal comfort and performance by our certified prosthetists. Prosthetic running legs are seldom covered by insurance plans leaving patients paying for these devices out-of-pocket or not obtaining the device — reducing the patient's ability to participate in activities that have positive mental and physical health outcomes. (*\$16,000*)

#### **Employee Assistance Fund**

This fund provides emergency relief to employees who experience unexpected financial hardship without needing to pay back the funds. Previous awards have been provided for needs that unexpectedly arise due to an emergency or other hardship such as medical bills, mortgage or rent payments, utilities, and costs associated with a house fire and an auto accident. (*Any amount is appreciated.*)
