#### **CAMP IS BACK IN SESSION!**

In its 39th year, WAS welcomed 48 campers from Michigan, Indiana and Ohio for Junior Wheelchair Sports Camp, presented by Saladin Shriners. Kids and teens ages 7 - 18 took over Grand Valley State University's campus playing sports like basketball, lacrosse and tennis. Every year, camp provides the chance for kids to come together through adaptive sports to try new activities, enjoy a bit of healthy competition and make lifelong friends.

The camp is led by instructors who are also competitive wheelchair athletes. It's a fun reunion when former campers return as volunteers to help mentor and encourage the young athletes.

A much-anticipated highlight of the week is the annual water fight with the Allendale Fire Department. Fire fighters bring their fire truck to create a large sprinkler and even join in the fun with coaches, volunteers and campers.

# WAS RECEIVES \$50,000 GRANT FROM THE HARTFORD

Mary Free Bed Wheelchair and Adaptive Sports was awarded a \$50,000 grant from The Hartford, a provider of disability insurance, for new sports equipment. The grant enabled WAS, a member of the Move United member network, to purchase adaptive sports equipment, including seven handcycles and three sports wheelchairs for the Inpatient Recreational Therapy department and the WAS program.

"With the generosity of Move United and The Hartford, our athletes now have access to equipment that gets them in the action and eliminates barriers to participation," said Maria Besta, manager, Recreational Therapy, Wheelchair and Adaptive Sports at Mary Free Bed. "Adaptive equipment costs can seem overwhelming for individuals who use a wheelchair to play sports. With this funding, they've opened doors and improved access to wellness, socialization and overall health."

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#### **THYME TO GARDEN**

The Mary Free Bed Recreational Therapy team expanded the Margaret G. Bertsch Outdoor Therapy Garden with an accessible therapy garden. The new "live wall" creates a space for patients to strengthen skills and connect with nature.

Recreational therapists help patients rebuild the skills they'll need to get back to what they love in life. Patients who plan to return to gardening can use therapy to build skills like shopping to purchase gardening supplies, planting in raised beds, using garden tools, and safely transitioning to uneven surfaces.

The live wall creates a calmer setting where patients and families can sit to experience a brief escape from a traditional hospital setting.

# LOCAL VETERAN AND MEDAL-WINNING PARALYMPIAN VISITS MARY FREE BED

Melissa Stockwell, West Michigan native and Paralympian, brought her story back home thanks to a partnership with SpartanNash and the Our Family® brand. She visited patients and hospital staff at Mary Free Bed and led a keynote speaking engagement this summer.

Melissa was a first lieutenant with the United States Army in Iraq before losing her leg in a roadside bombing, making her the first female soldier to lose a limb in the Iraq War. Following her recovery, she became a prosthetist, and then the first Iraq veteran to be chosen for the Paralympics. Since then, she's become a three-time medal-winning Paralympian, author and motivational speaker.

Melissa is the spokesperson for Our Family® brand, the flagship private label brand of local food solutions company, SpartanNash. The Mary Free Bed Wheelchair and Adaptive Sports program is an Our Family® legacy nonprofit partner receiving sponsorship through Our Family Cares® program. SpartanNash also supports Mary Free Bed by supplying breakfast foods enjoyed every day by guests at The Inn at Mary Free Bed, a temporary lodging site for patients and families in Grand Rapids.





Melissa toured the rehabilitation hospital and Orthotics & Prosthetics + Bionics facilities. She shared her story in a speech that included in-person guests and was livestreamed for the public. She also joined a breakout group with patients, hospital clinicians and adaptive athletes.

Melissa created her own non-profit, Dare2tri, aiming to remove barriers in sports and create a community for all athletes, regardless of ability. That effort aligns with both the Mary Free Bed mission to restore hope and freedom through rehabilitation and the Our Family Cares® grassroots initiative to help make our communities better places to live, play and grow.

# MARY FREE BED NAMED TOP 10 REHABILITATION HOSPITAL BY U.S. NEWS & WORLD REPORT

For ten years, Mary Free Bed Rehabilitation Hospital has been ranked within the top 50 Best Rehabilitation Hospitals in the country by *U.S. News & World Report*. This year, we're pleased to share our hospital is ranked among the nation's top ten leaders!

Mary Free Bed has been ranked as the **10th Best Rehabilitation Hospital** in the nation for 2023-2024. This is a significant jump from the previous ranking of 17th and a testimony to the hard work and dedication of the Mary Free Bed team.

The hospital was also rated very high for the number of patients treated who experienced strokes, brain injuries and spinal cord injuries. When it came to advanced technologies and on-site services for patients, Mary Free Bed was rated as "excellent."

The 2023-24 rankings considered 1,041 hospitals, and results were based on a number of factors including clinical outcomes, physician perception, quality of care and patient experience. Mary Free Bed exceeded the national average in several key metrics, including prevention of readmissions to general acute-care hospitals during and following rehabilitation stays, and the rate of patients being able to return home.

Mary Free Bed is a leader among rehabilitation providers in Michigan, Ohio, Indiana and Wisconsin. In fiscal year 2023, we served 98,000 patients across an expanding system of care.

#### **Leckey Squiggles Adaptive Seating System**

For use in our Pediatric Feeding Program, this seating system will provide ideal posture and positioning of the pelvis, torso, head, and legs for the child during their feeding sessions. We serve the most complex infants and children that need specific positioning for success. Currently, the program only has one standard highchair. (\$5,110)

#### **Rifton K130 Small Mobile Stander**

This device gives children in a wheelchair greater independence and mobility by strengthening critical motor skills to progress toward independent standing. This would be used for inpatient and outpatient pediatric patients ages 18 months to 4 years with diagnoses such as cerebral palsy, spina bifida and spinal cord injury. (\$3,600)

#### Freestanding Basketball Hoop

A new basketball hoop and ball are needed to help with physical aspects of rehabilitation and encourage patients to enjoy the outdoors. Gross motor skills, wheelchair movement skills, upper body strength, recall, processing directions and socialization skills are just a few of the benefits of having a freestanding basketball hoop at Mary Free Bed. Therapists of all disciplines utilize the basketball hoop with patients of all ages outside during the warmer months. (\$325)
